

# SCMLA 2008-Bridging "Borders" in San Antonio

SCMLA members crossed borders, boundaries, and barriers when they met in San Antonio to explore the theme of "Borders" at the Sheraton Gunter, San Antonio hotel for the 65<sup>th</sup> annual SCMLA convention. Some 400 members attended 26 special, 61 regular, and 14 allied sessions on November 6-8, 2008. On Thursday afternoon Arturo Madrid, the Murchison Distinguished Professor of Humanities at Trinity U-San Antonio, gave attendees insights into "Close Encounters of the Transgressive Kind" as he explored the cultural and artistic expression of transnational Mexican communities. On Friday afternoon, Naomi Shihab Nye, award winning poet, writer, anthologist, educator, and a lively, energetic, and inspiring speaker gave the plenary address entitled "Language as Gravity: We Have No Borders When We Read," followed by the President's Reception.

The Department of English and Communication Arts, the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, and the Department of Foreign Languages of **St. Mary's U** and the Department of English and the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures of the U of **Texas-San Antonio** served as sponsors for the conference with **Norma Cantú** acting as Local Arrangements Chair. Friday's activities started early with the SCCEA Breakfast speaker **Violet O'Valle**, Artistic Director of the Pantagleize Theatre Company in Fort Worth, Texas, speaking on "Irish Thea-

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ter Texas Style." **Frieda H. Blackwell** presided over the luncheon and business meeting and discussed the issue of undergraduate research, specifically in the humanities, and how it can enrich both our research and teaching, as well as the learning outcomes of our students.

Also at the luncheon the membership approved a dues increase to begin in 2010 of \$10.00 for Full, Associate, Assistant, and Joint Memberships. Graduate Student dues will increase by \$5.00 and Sustaining Departmental Memberships will increase by \$25.00. A three year membership will also be available at a discount.

The Edwin Mellen Press again sponsored the French, German, and Spanish language social on Friday afternoon, and, on Saturday morning, the Women's Caucus met for breakfast and round table discussions.

New officers, who will begin their service in 2009, are: Vice President **Deborah Arteaga** from the **U of Nevada-Las Vegas**; Russian and Less Commonly Taught Languages Representative **Luciana Namorato** from **Indiana U**; and Spanish Representative **Sharon Ugalde** from **Texas State U**. Three new Consulting Editors will join the *South Central Review*: **Mary Anne Garnett** from the **U of Arkansas-Little Rock, Ryan Long** from the **U of Oklahoma**, and **David McWhirter** from **Texas A&M U**.

# **Proposed Constitution Changes**

The following constitutional changes are proposed for adoption at the 2009 Baton Rouge convention. For a complete copy of the SCMLA Constitution, please go the website: <u>www.ou.edu/scmla.</u> Underlined phrases are additions.

#### IV. Officers

- The Executive Officers of the Association shall be: a President, a Vice-President, <u>a Past President</u>, an Editor of the Review, <del>a Business Manager of the Review,</del> and an Executive Director.
- 4. The Editor of the Review<del>, the Business Manager of the Review,</del> and the Executive Director shall be elected by the Executive Committee for a term of five years<del>, their terms to run concurrently</del>.

#### VII. Programs

 The Program of each section shall be arranged by its chair, who shall be elected by the section at the annual meeting. The section chair shall submit a program to the Executive Director at least three months before the annual meeting-and in time for publication in the fall issue of the Review.

#### VIII. The Review

The Association shall publish a <del>quarterly</del> Review <u>three times per year</u> staffed by an Editor, a Business Manager, <u>two Associate Editors</u>, and six Consulting Editors who shall be elected by the Association for a term of three years, staggered so that two new Consulting Editors are elected each year. The Review shall be a scholarly journal for members of the Association and the profession at large.

IX. Amendments

Proposed amendments to this constitution shall first be approved by the Executive Committee; they shall then be published in the winter <u>newsletter</u> <del>number</del> of the South Central Review,</del> and be ratified by a majority at the next annual meeting of the Association in order to become effective.
